

STUDENT VOTE WATCH

ARIZONA



HB 2260 proposes, “[A] temporary college or university address may not be used for determining residency for voter registration.”

Any student utilizing campus housing would not be eligible to register to vote at that address.

MAINE



LD 155 prohibits use of a campus address for registration without verification of ME driver's license, a vehicle registered in ME, or paying income or property tax.

The bill creates additional barriers for students attempting to register with a campus address.

NEW HAMPSHIRE



HB 309 further restricts issuance and expiration standards on student IDs for use as voter ID

This means many current student IDs would be out of compliance and students would not be able to use them to vote.

NEW YORK



SB 1661 and AB 1070 allows for preregistration starting at 16 and requires local school boards to have a plan to promote voter registration and preregistration.

Preregistration means 16-year-olds could register to vote in advance but are not eligible to vote until they are 18.

SOUTH CAROLINA



HB 3140 would require high schools to make sure students 17 years of age have completed a voter registration, which the school submits for the student.

The bill would ensure students are exposed to the voting process while still in high school.

TENNESSEE



HB 0079 adds Student IDs to the list of acceptable voter IDs.

The bill would increase voting access for out-of-state students and many other students without a TN driver's license.

WASHINGTON



- SB 5110 allows 16-year-olds to preregister to vote.
- Competing bill HB 1471 allows 17-year-olds to preregister.
